1. Core Thematic Concepts

This lesson explores how modern digital tools (text messaging and e-mailing) reflect distinct psychological profiles, communication habits, and emotional needs:

A. The Psychology of the Texter

Text messaging offers visual anonymity and emotional safety:

- **Uninhibited Expression:** Visual anonymity allows hidden aspects of personality to surface, making people more open to flirting and romantic confessions.
- **Discretion & Control:** Providing a safe distance where messages cannot be easily overheard and evidence can be quickly destroyed.
- **Vulnerability:** Texters can sometimes be insecure, shy, or needy, seeking reassurance, security, and comfort through constant connection.

B. The Psychology of the E-mailer

E-mailing is driven by strategic planning, structure, and emotional avoidance:

- **Control & Goal-Oriented:** E-mailers desire clear, concise control over content and timing, acting as strategic planners who focus on getting tasks done efficiently.
- **Aversion to Conflict:** E-mailers prefer focusing on their message rather than the recipient's immediate reaction, often struggling to handle emotional fallout or conflict face-to-face (e.g., firing staff or breaking up via e-mail).

2. Key Vocabulary for Essays

- **Anonymity:** The state of being anonymous or visually hidden, fostering uninhibited expression.
- **Discretion:** Keeping communication private, safe, and protected from being overheard.
- **Strategic planner:** Someone who organizes goals, timing, and content carefully (typical of e-mailers).
- **Uninhibited:** Expressing thoughts and feelings freely without restraint or shyness.
- **Goal-oriented:** Focused heavily on completing tasks efficiently.

*Example: "Hidden aspects of ourselves surface **because** of visual anonymity."*

- **Expressing Result:** *as a result, so... that, such... that.*

*Example: "We're much more likely to flirt **as a result**." / "The mobile phone has become **so** vital **that** no one can imagine daily life without it."*
